



UTO Ingathering October 7th and 8th

The UTO is an outreach of The Episcopal Church providing grants to support projects and missions of The Church and Anglican Communion. As I sat down to prepare to write this news letter article I was at a loss of what to say. Most of the information I have received from the UTO and ECW

over the past few months was about the birthday of Julia Chester Emery. The UTO is celebrating and honoring her Birthday September 25th. I had no idea who she was and was frustrated that there was little other news for me to draw from to write about. Apparently this woman was important....so I began to read and learn about her. I have been an Episcopalian since birth and my Dad was a supporter of the UTO, writing a sermon utilized by the UTO as one of their brochures. I don't recall ever hearing about her and would like to share with you some of what I have learned. Julia Chester Emery was the founder of The United Thank Offering. She was honored by The Church and is now remembered in the Liturgical Calendar on January 9. She was born September 24, 1852 in Dorchester, Massachusetts, and died January 9, 1922 in New York City. This year she would have been 162 years old.

In 1882 The Episcopal Church was supporting 29 missionary bishops and the Women's Auxiliary become a primary funder of their work. In 1883 a collection was taken during the Auxiliary's meeting and was divided among the domestic and foreign mission fields. At the Triennial Meeting in 1889 the Women's Auxiliary instituted the United Offering for the support of specific mission projects. This eventually became known as The United Thank Offering. "Blue Boxes" were used to collect offerings of thanks for life's blessings by the women of The Episcopal Church. The money was used to support missions and missionaries of The Episcopal Church. In time the UTO became the most important source for funding missionary projects which The Church's budget could not cover.



Through her work Julia Chester Emery fought for women to receive canonical status as deaconesses which to many is part of the foundation on which the ordination of women is built.

The UTO has a goal this year to raise an additional \$700,000 to support mission and ministry in honor of Julia Chester Emery. I read that there are about 2 million Episcopalians in the United States. If everyone gave a dollar.....if we all contribute something.... it adds up quickly! Please support this important outreach of The Church.

FROM PULPIT TO PEW

Our Annual Parish Meeting will take place on Sunday, October 1 beginning at about 11:30 am (after the 10:15 Eucharist). (It is possible you will be reading this after the meeting takes place.) At that meeting I will talk a little bit about my intended retirement and what St. Peter's will need to do to get ready to "call" not "hire" a new Rector. Use the term "call" because the Episcopal Church intends and believes that the "calling" is from God mutually discerned by Vestry and priest. Basically, that God has discerned who should be St. Peter's next Rector and your task and that of the field of priests is to discover God's choice. That process begins in humble prayer,

13. For the Election of a Bishop or other Minister

Almighty God, giver of every good gift: Look graciously on your Church, and so guide the minds of those who shall choose a rector for this parish (*or*, bishop for this Diocese), that we may receive a faithful pastor, who will care for your people and equip us for our ministries; through Jesus Christ our Lord. *Amen.* *1979 BCP page 818*

One of the pitfalls of the process is that parishioners think of only what they want in a Rector, not what's best for the parish as a whole. It is also in looking ahead, not back. Our past is the foundation for our future, but isn't meant to be reproduced in the future. Phrases like "we've never done it that way before" or "Fr. Don doesn't it like that" won't be very helpful going forward.

The Vestry will be contacting the Bishop to set up a meeting with him to learn of the procedures they will need to follow for this process. I will not be involved in the calling of my successor.

Enough about that, let me share with you some exciting things that are happening:

- *Beckie McCammitt, your Vestry person chair for Evangelism, has been busy. She has organized our millennial generation to gather for fun and service. They have strawberry picking, kayaking, and worked on a Habitat for Humanity build. Beckie also organized a table at the Medford Oktoberfest where cards were handed out, prayer requests received, candy available for the taking, and conversations about St. Peter's took place.
- *I (along with seven other Medford Clergy) was trained and appointed as a volunteer Chaplain for the Medford Police Department. Two of us will be on-call each month to assist the police officers as needed. We will be a bridge between the police and the community, and assist police officers and their families. This has been a long time in the making, and I am pleased to be a part of it.
- *We are once again taking our Blessing of Pets into the community on October 1 at 2 pm in Tomlinson Park (across from the Medford Library) on Main Street. For the second year in a row we are joining with Medford United Methodist Church, Faith Presbyterian Church, and Lord of Life Lutheran Church in bring this into our community in honor St. Francis.
- *The Fellowship of Religious Leaders in the Medford Community, of which I have been a part since my arrival (Fr. Moore helped start) will be offering an Interfaith Thanksgiving Service on the Sunday evening before Thanksgiving at the Medford Friends Meeting on Union Street. For the past several years this Service was at St. Mary of the Lakes Roman Catholic Church with a Choir festival preceding the Service. Things will be different this year. I hope you will come and join our community.

As you can see I am not sitting back waiting until July 1 but helping St. Peter's grow into the new mission field in which we find ourselves.

Church and Home

This year seems to have had more than its share of tragedies and those who have children or grandchildren may find themselves having conversations about tragic events like hurricanes Harvey, Irma and Maria, as well as riots and shooting that have occurred around the country and the world. These are very hard conversations to have with children of any age, and most of us don't necessarily feel confident about what we should or should not say. However, there are many good resources to help adults to have an appropriate conversation with children, so I'd like to offer some of these tips.

One of the most important things we can do is reassure children and teens that they are safe. Limit television for young children and be ready to have a conversation with teens about what they are seeing. Teens may need to be reassured that the whole world is not in total chaos and you can talk about the good things people are doing to help each other.

Expect and give permission for a wide range of emotions from children and teens. Watch your child for behavior that is not normal for them and continue to reassure them that you will do everything you can to keep them safe.

The best plan is to discuss things honestly, but without a lot of graphic detail. Be gently concrete and truthful when answering questions. Keep the conversation age appropriate.

Reinforce your family's values. As a person of faith you can say "I just don't know why these things happen", but you can point to how God uses people in bad situations to help those who are sick, injured or in danger. As Mr. Roger's mother pointed out to him when he was a child, "You should always look for the helpers." We can be helpers too.

Find appropriate ways to let your children help. You can pray together as a family and there are many good prayers in our Book of Common Prayer. (See the section Prayers and Thanksgivings, pages 814-841) Our Sunday School will be making Prayer Cards during the next several weeks that will be sent to the Dioceses of Texas, Louisiana and Florida. This should help our children think about and act on ways they can help with encouraging words and prayers for the people who are going through these hard times. Since clothing and household items should not be donated at this time perhaps your family could have a yard sale and donate the money to Episcopal Relief and Development.

Have a safety plan in place for your family in the event of an emergency. This is something we may think about, but maybe it's time to do it. Children and adults feel more secure if they know what to do if there is an emergency and do not leave it to chance that things will work out without a plan. There are many sites that offer suggestions for how to do this including our own Episcopal Relief and Development.

If you would like to have more information about talking to your child or teen about these hard subjects please just ask. I have lots of information in my files.

St. Peters will be hosting homeless families the week of Oct. 15-22

We need volunteers each day for the following:

Transportation- pick up our guests each day at 5 pm from Interfaith Hospitality (IHN) on Main Street in Moorestown and drive them to St. Peters. At 6:45 am drive our guests from St. Peters to IHN . The van is provided by IHN.

Overnight lodging at St. Peters- each night we need two adults to stay with the homeless. Volunteers will arrive at St. Peters around 8:30 pm and leave the next morning around 7 am. Cots will be provided for all volunteers. You will need to bring your own pillow, sheet and blanket.

Food- provide dinner at St. Peters. Volunteers providing and serving dinner need to be at St. Peters from 5 pm to 7 pm. Volunteers will also be needed to prepare to go bags for breakfast and lunch daily.

Entertainment- play games or other activities with the homeless after dinner. Volunteers will be at St. Peters from 6:30 pm to 8:30 pm. We welcome St. Peters youth group to participate.

Set up and take down of cots and convert Sunday school classrooms to bedrooms- After the 10:15 service on Sunday, October 15, remove school tables and chairs, set up cots, install window treatments, make the bed for each homeless guest and lay a towel and wash cloth on each homeless guest's cot. On Sunday October 22 around 8:45 am, take down the cots and place them into the storage trailer, set up the tables and chairs in the classrooms, remove the window treatments and drive the van and storage trailer to the next church.

Laundry- wash sheets, blankets and towels.



A Vital Ministry Needs You

St. Peter's Altar Guild is looking for those of you who would like to serve our church in a small but very important way. The altar guild's ministry, simply put, is to prepare the sanctuary for services. One's time commitment for this would involve about an hour and a half monthly, working with a team, to prepare for the weekend's services. Here's what the altar guild members do to prepare for services on their assigned week.



Prepare and set out wine, Communion wafers, chalices, cruets, linens, collection plates, the missal, the Gospel, and anything else needed for the celebration of the Eucharist for each service.

Change altar frontal and linens for each season and for special occasions/services.

Post hymns on the hymn boards, fill candles with oil, refresh Holy Water at the entrances, and polish brass items.

Because you work with your team members on an assigned week, "many hands make light work" in this preparation. After each service, altar guild members clean off the altar and set out what is needed for the next service. After the 10:15 service each Sunday, all is cleaned up and put away for next week. Clean up takes about ten minutes.

This ministry is vital to our church and is a worthy endeavor. It is a great way to meet and work with other members, and it provides a sense of satisfaction and fulfillment in knowing you are contributing to the celebration of the Eucharist at St. Peter's. At present, the altar guild is especially in need of volunteers who attend the 10:15 service, but all are welcome and we'd love to have anyone join this friendly and dedicated group of volunteers.
