FROM PULPIT TO PEW

The month of November is bookmarked by All Saints' Day on November 1 and Thanksgiving Day on the last Thursday (this year November 26). It seems we are always looking too far down the road and fail to enjoy and appreciate the now. My brother posted on Facebook a photo of the Christmas section at a big box store last week. Lynn and I were in a department store and purchased (and had wrapped) some Christmas presents for great nieces and nephews (we've never done that before). I say these things, not because I think it is bad, actually it might be good for us to stretch out our Christmas spending. I say it because I believe we are in jeopardy of losing our ability to give thanks for what we have right now. Too often we don't appreciate something or someone until it/they are taken away from us.

St. Paul in his Epistle to the Ephesians writes: *And do not get drunk with wine, for that is debauchery; but be filled with the Spirit, addressing one another in psalms and hymns and spiritual songs, singing and making melody to the Lord with all your heart, always and for everything giving thanks in the name of our Lord Jesus Christ to God the Father. (Ephesians 5:18-20)*

In the 1979 Book of Common Prayer, the question is asked in the Catechism (page 857), "For what do we offer thanksgiving?" Answer: *Thanksgiving is offered to God for all the blessings of this life, for our redemption, and for whatever draws us closer to God.* Throughout the Prayer Book there are examples of prayers of thanksgiving: The General Thanksgiving in Morning and Evening Prayer; The Great Thanksgiving (also known as the Eucharistic Prayer, five of which are included); there are the Post Communion Prayers at the end of each Eucharist; the Thanksgivings in the "Prayers and Thanksgivings" section (pages 836-841), these include *A General Thanksgiving, A Litany of Thanksgiving, For the Mission of the Church, for the Saints and Faithful Departed, For the Nation, For Heroic Service, For the Diversity of Races and Cultures, For the Beauty of the Earth, For the Harvest, For the Gift of a Child, and For the Restoration of Health.*

Giving thanks is an antidote to coveting what others have, to feeling sorry for oneself. I said in a recent Sermon that if we own a house we have more wealth than 95% of the world's population. Let us give thanks. Recently, I heard someone say that we don't know what we need until we go to the mall or store, and they show us.

Of course, there always is that question of whether we are a glass half full or a glass half empty kind of person. Truth be told, all of our glasses are more than half full. Let us, this "season of thanksgiving" give God thanks for all that we are and have.

Almighty God, Father of all mercies, we your unworthy servants give you humble thanks for all your goodness and loving-kindness to us and to all whom you have made. We bless you for our creation, preservation, and all the blessings of this life; but above all for your immeasurable love in the redemption of the world by our Lord Jesus Christ; for the means of grace, and for the hope of glory. And, we pray, give us such an awareness of your mercies, that with truly thankful hearts we may show forth your praise, not only with our lips, but in our lives, by giving up our selves to your service, and by walking before you in holiness and righteousness all our days; through Jesus Christ our Lord, to whom with you and the Holy Spirit, be honor and glory throughout all ages. Amen. (1979 Book of Common Prayer, page 125)

KIDS' CORNER

In the spring, Bishop (Chip) Stokes, organized a conference that was attended by 400 people from Episcopal churches around our diocese. At this gathering two speakers, John Roberto and David Anderson spoke about doing Christian formation in a different way than we have been doing it over the years.

What we face is that many of the congregations in our diocese (and around the nation) are so small that they do not have a Sunday School. St. Peter's is very fortunate to have a large number of families with children who attend Sunday School on a fairly regular basis. But is attending Sunday School alone enough to provide a sound faith formation? What can or should we be doing to help our children and youth "catch the faith" that we know is important to pass on to them?

One of the points that the speakers at the Bishop's Spring Conference shared that struck home with me is that parents are the first and most important teachers of faith for their children. Many of us grew up in a society where we were surrounded by people who shared the same religion, values and ethnic heritage. Some of us were smothered by it. That is not as true today. Families are more spread out and we don't always have them close by to show the next generation what is important to know and practice about our faith. Families are much busier now, and not as likely to attend church every week like they did in the 1950's and 60's. Churches are now facing the challenge of teaching the adults so they can teach the children at home when they can't be in church on Sunday.

So what can we do about this? Part of the Christian formation ministry of St. Peter's is to have cross-generation events to help all of us prepare for major Christian holidays. There is no agenda other than to have a chance for families, with and without children, to come together and share this time. As Christmas approaches in another month, the church begins its preparations with the season of Advent. We will use the Sunday morning Christian formation hour (9 – 10 AM) on **November 22nd** to make **Advent Wreaths** for our homes. The next Sunday is the first Sunday of Advent so we'll be all ready! There will be materials to make the wreath and take-home materials to use with your wreath as you go through the season of Advent. Please watch for a sign –up sheet so we know how many supplies we need to have for you.

Come and join us for this Advent Event. Continue or start a new tradition that will help you or your children catch the faith!

Following is our first letter from Father Joseph Tancrel Diegue, the new Priest-in-Charge of Redemption School, St. Basil's Church, and the associated clinic, all in Gonaives, Haiti.

Dear Hellen,

I have received your e-mail and I would like to take the time to thank you sincerely. I am happy to learn that your parish St. Peter's Church is in partnership with Redemption's school. As you may already know, the institution of Redemption consists of: St. Basile Legrand's Church, Redemption's school and a medical clinic. The school has a total of 425 students from pre k to High School. Thank you for praying for the people of St. Basile's church and the students of Redemption's school and I also want to let you know that we are doing the same thing on our side.

I am very happy to hear that you have \$2000 in your annual budget for Redemption's school. Thank you in advance because that will help us enormously. I will keep you posted on how the money is used. You can always send us the funds through the Haiti companionship program; however it's not the easiest route to take due to location. You can also send it to us also through Western Union, which has an office not too far from Redemption's school and I will alert the Companionship program as soon as it's available.

May God bless our partnership.

We would very much appreciate the chance to send a small group of 2-3 people to visit you early in 2016, perhaps in February, but would like to know whether such a visit would be convenient. I know that you are still adjusting to your new role.

Once that event is over, I should be able to send the remainder of our first year's pledge to you. Because our pledge funds are not budgeted, but raised by members of our congregation, we send funds as they become available. However, we are very open to special requests if we are in a position to help.
