\*November 19th and 20th, 2016\*

Fall is my favorite season. The air is crisp, the leaves turn beautiful colors, we go on hayrides, pick apples and pumpkins, roast pumpkin seeds, rake leaves into piles for jumping in.....there's football and the excitement of a new school year. When I lived on a farm many years ago it was a time of harvest and hard work!! Some years the rabbits, deer, and woodchucks didn't leave much behind but we always had enough. Sometimes we had more than enough and gave to our neighbors who would then have enough and take bags of produce to work to share. And so it went year to year, but always we learned to share what we had. I guess at this time of year with Thanksgiving approaching we all think about what we are grateful for and it's a perfect time to share our thanks with others by giving what we can to the UTO at the upcoming Ingathering. All of the money that is raised the UTO grants to promote mission and ministries within The Episcopal Church and Anglican Communion.

Here are the latest UTO updates:

At this years Spring Ingathering the Dioceses of New Jersey raised \$8907.86 in contributions to the UTO and here at St. Peter's we raised \$338.00 for the UTO.

In June 2016 the UTO announced that it awarded more than \$1 million (\$1,161,314.62) to promote projects in 32 dioceses for the mission and ministry of The Episcopal Church and Anglican Communion.

Of these, 25 dioceses are located in the United States, 5 are non-domestic dioceses (one is Haiti), 6 companion dioceses, 1 grant to the Office of the Presiding Bishop, and 1 Presiding Bishop grant.

Two of the grants in the US went to dioceses to promote projects to help our Native American brothers and sisters.

\$41,500 to the dioceses of Navaho land to protect the Precious Sustainable Practices for Water and Harvest within the Navajo Nation.

\$50,000 to the dioceses of North Dakota to the Seven Generations Energy Renewing and Sustaining Project within four Native American Reservations.

Please visit the Episcopal Church web site to learn more about the wonderful history of the Church and the Navajo/American Indian people.

Also, there you can find the UTO and see where the grants go and how they are utilized if you would like. There is too much info to list it all here. Just know that every cent makes a difference!!!

# FROM PULPIT TO PEW

November is a great month in the Church calendar. We begin on the 1st with All Saints' Day. The Collect for the day tells us what we need to know: *Almighty God, you have knit together your elect in one communion and fellowship in the mystical body of your Son Christ our Lord: Give us grace so to follow your blessed saints in all virtuous and godly living, that we may come to those ineffable joys that you have prepared for those who truly love you; through Jesus Christ our Lord, who with you and the Holy Spirit lives and reigns, one God, in glory everlasting. Amen.*

We end on the 30<sup>th</sup> with the commemoration of St. Andrew. He is not only the Patron Saint of Scotland, but the one who brought Simon Peter, his brother, to Jesus. What might we do about St. Andrew's Day, the Collect for the Day tells us "Give us, who are called by your Holy Word, grace to follow him without delay, and to bring those near to us into his gracious presence;..."

These two celebrations bookend our month but they also hold up for us two important aspects of the Christian life. From All Saints' Day, we get the connection we have with all of the followers of Jesus "Saints" who have come before us, who are walking the journey with us now, and those who will come after us. I imagine this celebration like the Olympic Stadium filled to capacity with those who have already completed their earthly life cheering on those who are still running and coming into the stadium – giving them encouragement, hope, and a sense of comradery. On this day we are reminded that we are not alone, we don't have to be pioneers because Jesus has already run the race, and countless others have as well.

St. Andrew's Day reminds us that we all have a responsibility to bring others to Jesus. Like Andrew, we are not responsible for what happens after we bring them. The responsibility rests with Jesus. We do have to say why we believe and what difference that makes to our life. Otherwise, why bother to bring someone else to Jesus.

Between these two days are three other dates worth noting: Thanksgiving Day, November 24 when we celebrate as a Nation. As we give thanks, it helps to remember the "thanks" we are giving is to God. In the General Thanksgiving in Morning Prayer, we get down to some specifics, "We bless you for our creation, preservation, and all the blessings of this life; but above all for your immeasurable love in the redemption of the world by our Lord Jesus Christ; for the means of grace, and for the hope of glory." The prayer goes on to pray for our awareness of God's mercies so that we might "with truly thankful hearts" show forth God's praise.

There is the last Sunday of the Church year on November 20, also called "Christ the King." The following Sunday, November 27 is the first Sunday of the new Church year, Advent I.

Of course, I couldn't talk about this month without acknowledging Election Day on November 8. We will be electing our President and a third of Congress. This election season has been the most uncomfortable and nasty of any I can remember. It is leaving many disgusted and concerned about the future. I have found a hymn text by Thomas Kelly living in the late 18<sup>th</sup> to early 19<sup>th</sup> Century in Ireland, helpful and hopeful. I pray you will find it so, as well.

1 When we cannot see our way,  
Let us trust, and still obey;  
He who bids us forward go,  
Cannot fail the way to show.

4 Night with Him is never night,  
Where He is, there all is light;  
When He calls us, why delay?  
They are happy who obey.

2 Though the sea be deep and wide,  
Though a passage be denied;  
Fearless let us still proceed,  
Since the Lord vouchsafes to lead.

5 Be it ours then while we're here,  
Him to follow without fear!  
Where He calls us, there to go,  
What He bids us, that to do.

3 Though it seems the gloom of night,

## **Praying Facebook**

### **What Is 'Praying Facebook'?**

Most of us spend moments of each day on some form of social media. Why not turn this routine and sometimes mindless action into an intentional, sustaining prayer practice?

### **Why Does This Form of Prayer Matter?**

Praying Facebook is a way to shift our focus to the needs of others - making the cares and concerns not about us, but rather about the people who share theirs. Rather than be irritated with the fancy dinner photo your coworker shares, offer up prayers of gratitude that she has had such a wonderful experience.

Praying Facebook is also a way to make sacred something that is both meaningless and meaningful. You know this to be true if you have ever unfriended, blocked, or angrily commented on a post that you didn't agree with. In real life..., would you ever say to someone, "I don't want to be your friend," stamp your foot and huff off? When you invite the God who longs for wholeness into the global dialog that occurs through social media, perhaps you find more understanding and less to unfriend.

Through my practice, I have started to think less about what people are posting and more about the feelings and emotions that drive what they post. Anger and judgment [are often] the products of people who are entrenched in fear... Meeting those people on social media platforms, and inviting God to be present as well, starts to change fear into compassion.

### **How to Pray Facebook**

Praying Facebook can be done by anyone, any place, at any time. I started by simply saying a prayer for each person I scrolled past, "God, be with Mark. God, send your love to Jim."

My practice then grew to praying for the person and what they were posting about. This does take a bit more reading and thinking about the lives of others... Your sister posts about having a hard day at work, or her kids are driving her crazy? My prayer would look something like this: "God, thank you for Sara and the work she does at her job/with her kids. Be with her, God, as she continues her work."

...The next level involves praying for those who make you really angry. Before you block or unfriend, pray. It requires a level of wondering about what drives them, pondering where they are in life and how they got there. It is about...seeing them as a beloved child of God. Just like you.

I would like to share with you all a personal story...it involves the UTO as it relates to my life. After writing the last UTO article for the newsletter for the Spring ingathering and learning that my dad's sermon was once used as a UTO Brochure, I asked him to read what I had written for input/comments.

I had done this so many times in life with school papers etc. and he was glad to do so as always. After reading it he called and said he wouldn't change a thing (that was a first!!). But, he said, he might add something. I instinctively grabbed for a pen/pencil and any paper close by-- this felt important. Like when the professor says you may want to write this down it may be on the exam. He proceeded to say this: It may seem we have little and our little can't help much. But when we thankfully give even of the little we have, it makes a difference.

God uses our thankful little to provide much for many! I knew my dad was directing this statement to me--for he knew I had very little and as always encouraged me to give and be thankful. We said our goodbyes and see you soon. I had to rush off to work knowing I would see him the next weekend for Easter.

The next Morning I received a call informing me that my dad had passed away. I didn't get to see him again and his last words to me were about giving and the UTO. I doesn't surprise me now that I think about it. It was his way. I realize that though at the time it seemed the words were directed to me they were really meant for me to share. So, I share them with you.

I have one last thing to share with you all. It's a song by John Denver called "I Want to Live". As a counselor at E.C.C.C. (Episcopal Camp and Conference Center) each unit of campers was responsible to lead the church service every Sunday at the lakeside Chapel.

One year we choreographed a dance to this song with the children forming a cross at the end.
